1. Apologies

There being 33 in attendance, a quorum was reached.

2. Minutes of last AGM, Sept 30, 2010, Melbourne

5. Treasurer's Report

- The society had a surplus of \$20,029.87 for the year 2010/2011, largely associated with donations for Plants in Action 2.
- Membership increased slightly. There are 244 ordinary members, 164 student members, 29 retired members, 10 corresponding members, 2 Honorary members, 6 life members and 2 Gratis members.
- 23 students received grants around \$10,000 to attend the International Botanical Congress in Melbourne. 9 students will receive support to attend ComBio in Cairns.

8. Student Travel Grants

Council had discussed the issue of student travel grants and decided in favour of restricting these to support attendance at ComBio. This year, an exception had been made by providing grants

to assist students to attend the International Botanical Congress in Melbourne in lieu of the society sponsoring the IBC and symposium speakers. It was suggested that bringing forward the travel grant application process and announcing the offers early in the year would assist students to leverage financial support from other sources.

The case for whether a student could apply more than once to travel to a ComBio was discussed. The general feeling was that this was acceptable.

Dr Janet Wheeler suggested that instead of attending a ComBio, students could apply for a grant to attend an international conference outside Australia in their specialist area as this would be beneficial towards establishing contacts for future employment. This proposal needs to be considered further by Council.

9. Annual subscriptions

Annual subscriptions for next year were set at \$85 for one year or \$155 for two years for full members and \$60 for four years for students.

This resolution was moved by Narayana Upadhyaya, seconded by David Tissue and unanimously approved.

10. Student Poster Awards

1) Poster #65 Michael van der Kwast 'Bimolecular fluorescent complementation analysis of the plant specific histone deacetylase family and its interaction with 14-3-3 proteins in *Arabidopsis thaliana*.'

2) Poster #87 Sandra Schmoeckel 'Regulation of AtHKT1;1 expression, a gene encoding for a sodium transporter in plants.'

3) Poster #82 Jessica Bovill 'Characterisation of the barley V-PPase (HVP10), a candidate gene for salinity tolerance.'

Posters were judged by Zhonghua Chen, Chevaun Smith, Megan Shelden and Brent Kaiser. The winners were congratulated and the judges thanked for their efforts.

11. Phytogen

Tina Offler encouraged people to submit educational material to Phytogen. Links to useful sites, to Plants in Action and teaching materials would help those involved in teaching.

12. Robertson travelling fellowship
